

This wonderful new book from Michael Rosen tells the story of a big bear and a little bear preparing for their winter sleep. Little Bear gathers dreams of happiness, home and hope from the forest's inhabitants to help see them through winter. A seasonal must read!



Catch! by Trish Cooke

A brilliant picture book! In this delightful story, we follow Kiona on a sunny afternoon as she embarks on an adventure with her mum to catch various objects. From a ball that is too big to a tiny berry she can't see, Kiona's quest seems to have no joy. But her loving mother knows the perfect thing that Kiona can catch — a kiss! A book full of repetition and rich in its use of sounds and sensations for children to identify and enjoy alongside eye catching illustrations too.

A must read for younger children.



My Nature Trail by Rachel and Paul Lawston

This book is an excellent way of introducing young children to nature. It combines information and activity suggestions for each season and incorporates pages where children can write down notes on what they have seen and done. The book is wonderful for encouraging children to get outside and experience nature.


A must read for KS1 children.

Everyone loves a classic fairytale, but a mash up can be simply brilliant! This twisted fairytale is a hilarious mash up of The Old Woman Who Swallowed a Fly and The Princess and the Pea. It follows the same cumulative narrative of the former as the pea guzzles cake, cheese and even the table; and plays with the central conceit of the latter — of course a princess would feel a GIANT pea under her mattress!

Wow! What an amazing book. It's exciting, thrilling, action packed and whizzes along at break-neck speed! The front cover and description appealed to me as it reminded me of the film WALL-E — a favourite. It is very cleverly written with each paragraph starting with snippets of a character's memoir and adverts. This book is an emotional rollercoaster. My favourite character is not actually the main character, but a robot called Gunner. He makes you laugh out loud!


A must read for KS2 children.



<u>Hear Our Voices: A Powerful Retelling of the British Empire by Radhika Natarajan, Chao Tayiana and Alexander Mostov</u>

This wonderful book portrays twenty real-life stories from historical figures who had notable encounters with the British Empire in first-person, illustrated format. It opens with an extended introductory section providing well-communicated context, and is wide ranging in both history and geography.

A great read for UKS2.



Finding Bear by Hannah Gold
